

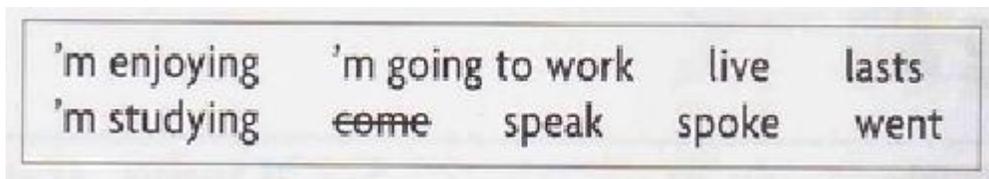

- What, which, and whose can be followed by a noun. (what time, which jacket, whose pen)
- Which is generally used when there is a limited choice. (Ex: Which is your car? The red one or the black one?)
- How can be followed by an adjective or an adverb. (How big...? How fast...?)
- How can also be followed by *much, many*

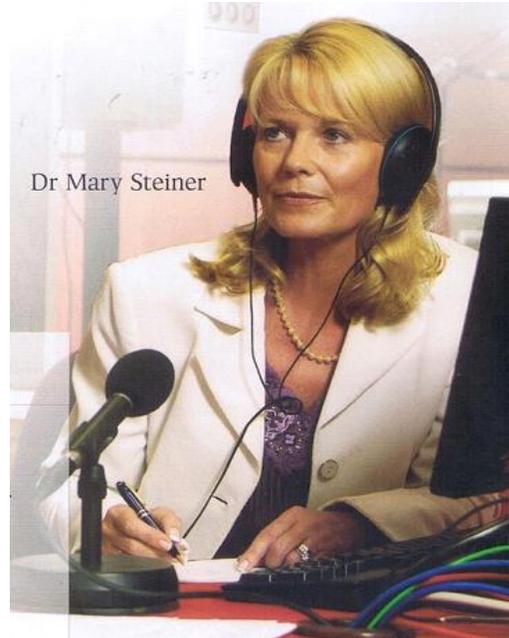

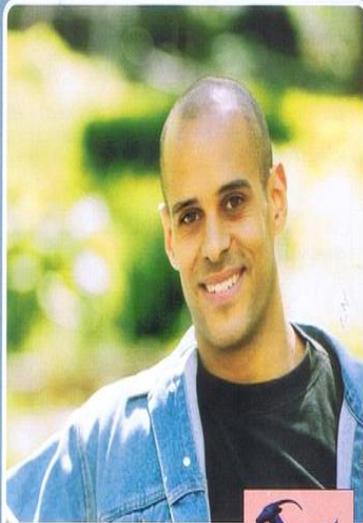

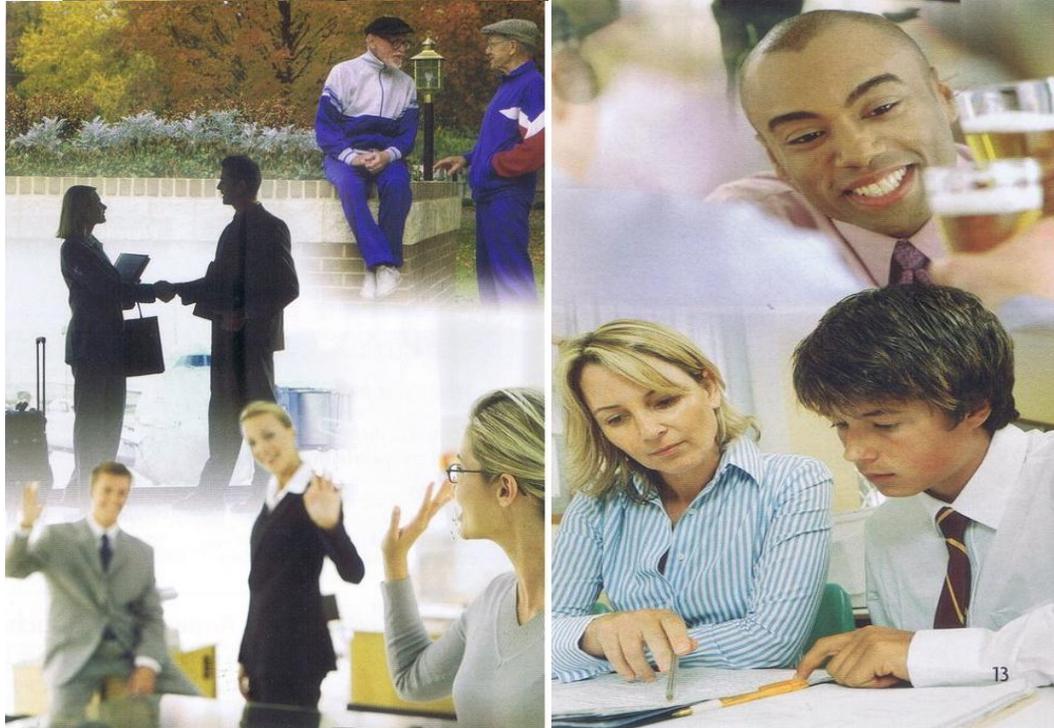
