Note: We base on the phonetic spelling of a word to choose "a" or "an" for it.

- When we pronounce "u" /ju:/, we use "a". Ex: a university.
- When "h" is silent, we use "an". Ex: an hour.

## Note:

- Most nouns add -s in the plural.

stamps, keys, cameras, tickets, boards, newspapers, pens....

- If the noun ends in -ch, -x, -sh, -s, or -ss, add -es.

dress - dresses, bus - buses, class - classes, wish - wishes, match - matches...

- If the noun ends in a consonant + - o, add -es.

tomato – tomato**ES**, potato - potato**ES**, ...

Note: photo - photoS

- But if the noun ends in a vowel + -o, add -s.

radio - radios

- If the noun ends in a consonant + -y, the -y changes to -ies.

baby - babies country - countries, party - parties, lady - ladies...

- But if the noun ends in a vowel + -y, the -y doesn't change.

toy – toys, key - keys, monkey – monkeys, day - days, ...

# - Some nouns are irregular.

foot - feet, child - children, person - people, woman - women, man - men, ...


