stamps, keys, cameras, tickets, boards ,newspapers, pens....
- If the noun ends in $\boldsymbol{- c h},-\mathrm{x},-\boldsymbol{s h},-\boldsymbol{s}$, or $\boldsymbol{- s \boldsymbol { s }}$, add -es.
dress - dresses, bus - buses, class - classes , wish - wishes, match - matches...
- If the noun ends in a consonant $+\boldsymbol{-} \boldsymbol{\sigma}$, add -es.
tomato - tomatoES, potato - potatoES, ...
Note: photo - photoS
- But if the noun ends in a vowel + - os, add -s.
radio - radios
- If the noun ends in a consonant $+\boldsymbol{- y}$, the $-\boldsymbol{y}$ changes to $\mathbf{- i e s}$.
baby - babies country - countries, party - parties, lady - ladies...
- But if the noun ends in a vowel $+\boldsymbol{- y}$, the $-\boldsymbol{y}$ doesn't change.
toy - toys, key - keys, monkey - monkeys, day - days, ...
- Some nouns are irregular.
foot - feet, child - children, person - people, woman - women, man - men, ...
