We can't sing that song.

I couldn't ride a horse last year.

Can you play tennis with me?

Could you write poetry when you ten?

Form:

(+) Positive	S + can/ could + V (inf).
(-) Negative	S + can't/couldn't + V (inf).
(?) Question and answer	Can/ Could + S + V (inf)?
	Yes, S + can/could.
	No, S + can't/ couldn't.

Note:

- *Can* and *Can't* have the same form in all persons. There is no *Do* or *Does. Can* is followed by the infinitive (without to).
- *Could* is the past of *Can. Could* and *Couldn't* have the same form in all persons. *Could* is followed by the infinitive (without to).

and answer	Yes, S + was/were.
	No, S + wasn't/ weren't.

 $\underline{\text{Note:}}$ Was/ Were is the past of am/ is/ are.
